In 2024, Racine Kenosha Community Action Agency, Inc. proudly served nearly 50,000 residents across Racine and Kenosha Counties.

Guided by its four pillars—Housing, Food & Nutrition, Health, and Asset Attainment—RKCAA remained focused on delivering programs that address the fundamental needs of households in our communities. Key initiatives included housing counseling, weatherization services (such as emergency furnace repairs and appliance replacements), health screenings, and educational opportunities designed to promote greater self-sufficiency.

Through the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), RKCAA supported more than 5,300 unduplicated participants, ensuring that families had access to essential nutrition and health services.

The leadership of RKCAA is deeply proud and grateful for the tireless efforts of our volunteers, community partners, individual donors, and funders. Your support is vital to strengthening Racine and Kenosha communities and helping our neighbors build brighter futures.



WAP served **498** individuals, increasing the number of households gaining access to cost-saving energy measures, including:

- **197** Dwellings Weatherized
- **265** Emergency Furnace Repairs
- 100 Water Heaters Installed
- 42 Central Air Conditioning System

The Skills Enhancement Program (SEP)

SEP provided opportunities for participants to move closer to becoming self-sufficient by offering financial assistance for tuition, books, transportation, childcare, and other unmet financial obligations not covered by financial aid.

All 2024 program graduates who obtained a new job are working in their chosen fields, with an average hourly increase of **\$11.67/hr**. or **\$35,238** annually.

The individuals completed post-secondary education, earning an Associate of Arts as Licensed Professional and Registered Nurses, Surgical Tech, and Medical Assistant.

Braeley's Story

Braeley, a single mother of two, enrolled in SEP in March of 2024, pursuing her Associate of Arts Degree as a Medical Assistant. She worked on campus as a cashier but did not earn enough to support her household.

When Braeley enrolled, she was prepared to complete her education. She never missed an appointment; any document she needed to deliver was brought in the next day. Living with a relative, by definition, Braeley was homeless. However, she was not going to let that defeat her. On December 14, 2024, she completed her degree in Medical Assisting. On December 30, 2024, she began a full-time position at Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee, more than doubling her income, in addition to securing housing for herself and her two children.



Wisconsin Help for Homeowners (WHH)

From 2020 to 2024, RKCAA administered the Wisconsin Help for Homeowners Program in Racine and Kenosha Counties. The program supported eligible homeowners, regardless of mortgage status, who faced financial hardship after January 2020.

Assistance covered overdue expenses such as mortgage payments, property taxes, and utilities. The program concluded at the end of 2024, having provided **\$7.4 million** in aid to homeowners in Racine and Kenosha Counties over four years.

Housing Stability Services (HSS)

RKCAA provides housing stability services, including budgeting, landlord/tenant mediation, referrals for legal services, and assistance in completing applications for other available community resources, such as rental assistance, subsidized housing, FoodShare, energy assistance, and agency-related programs. HSS provided services to **2,810** households in 2024.





Diaper Distribution Program (DDP)

Diapers are essential for the daily care of infants and toddlers, yet an estimated 1 in 3 families struggles to afford them. DDP supports families by distributing diapers through TEFAP-participating food pantries in Racine County and the WIC program in Kenosha County.

In 2024, this program assisted **1,366** families, helping to ease the financial burden of basic childcare needs and promote the health and wellbeing of young children.

Providing Relief for a Grandmother in Need

A grandmother caring for her two infant grandchildren, living on a fixed income, visited one of our partner food pantries to pick up her monthly CSFP box. During her visit, she shared her struggle to afford diapers. Our team immediately connected her with the Diaper Distribution Program, providing much-needed diapers and wipes. Grateful for the support, she expressed how this assistance eased her financial burden and gave her peace of mind.





<u>Commodity Supplemental Food Program</u> (CSFP)

RKCAA partnered with the State of Wisconsin's Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), Festival Foods, The Potato King, Inc., and the Shalom Center, Inc., enabling seniors to access healthier food options.

In 2024, **10,009** seniors received nutritious commodity food boxes in Racine and Kenosha Counties.

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

Through WIC, **5,310** pregnant women, new moms, infants, and children under five were supported with resources to keep families healthy and strong in 2024. Hybrid options enabled services to be provided in-person, by phone, or via the WIC on the Go mobile unit.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)

RKCAA serves as the lead Emergency Feeding Organization (EFO) for Racine and Kenosha Counties. The agency administers programs that assist food-insecure households, focusing on access and nutrition. In 2024, partner programs:

- Distributed 1,195,554 lbs. of food
- Served 38,754 households & 137,767 individuals
- Served **280,125** meals



Holiday Food Basket Distribution

RKCAA collaborates with the Racine County Food Bank (RCFB), CNH Industrial America, LLC (CNH), and other local community partners, providing holiday food boxes to individuals with disabilities, senior citizens, and others. During the 2024 holiday season, **2,249** eligible Racine County residents were able to prepare healthy meals.

Improving Access to Healthy Options

Seniors Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP)

The SFMNP provides income-eligible Racine and Kenosha County residents 60 years or older with coupons totaling \$45 to purchase fresh, locally grown fruits and vegetables at local farmer markets and approved farmstands.

SFMNP checks were issued to **618** Racine seniors and **751** Kenosha seniors during the 2024 season. Compared to 2023, **241** more seniors participated in the 2024 season.



Fit Families

Fit Families is a nutrition education program serving families enrolled in WIC. Fit Families strives to prevent childhood obesity by assisting families in adopting healthy eating habits and physical activity behaviors through coaching. In 2024, **90%** of children ate four or more servings of fruits and veggies per day at graduation, compared to 84% at enrollment. Additionally, **81%** of children drank 6 oz. or less of juice per day at graduation compared to 65% at enrollment.

WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program

In 2024, **2,178** clients received farmer market nutrition program checks, which provided increased access to fresh fruits and vegetables.

On-Site Farmstand

Throughout the summer and fall, RKCAA hosts on-site farmstands at its Racine and Kenosha locations. These farmstands offer families and seniors more opportunities to redeem their vouchers, explore fresh, local produce, and enjoy added resources like cookbooks and recipe samples—all designed to support healthy, affordable eating.

Partnership with Kenosha YMCA for Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) Cancer Prevention Program

In partnership with Kenosha YMCA and thanks to the HEAL grant, **76** WIC families participated in a series of nutrition and physical activity seminars around eating healthier and being more active to reduce their risk of cancer. As part of their participation, families received a 3-month Kenosha YMCA family membership.
